# Gagea lutea (Yellow Star-of-Bethlehem) survey

Date: 6 April 2025

Location: Whitehill Wood beside River Evenlode, North Leigh parish

Last year, this location was flooded during the period when this plant would flower. This year, although there is no flooding, and a much warmer start to spring, this species appears to have not recovered from the previous year. Only one Yellow Star of Bethlehem was observed in flower this year, location SP 39071 15465, although numerous non-flowering leaves were observed.

Plants started about 450m along the path from the road bridge that crosses Ashford Mill Stream and continued in fairly regular succession for 260m or so, when they dwindled off and so we stopped looking, before reaching the railway bridge.

#### From Keith Cohen:

It was good to see a flowering plant of the *Gagea*, and to spend a little time getting to know the leaf characters.

I had seen in Oxfordshire's Threatened Plants that it had also been recorded at Sturt wood so I went on and walked the river edge there.

I walked from the west edge where it meets the field, along to the east, and continued in the wood at the foot of the slope, alongside the field past the river bend.

It was much less productive, with only 3 locations where I saw leaves, and no flowers.

## **GRID REFERENCES WERE:**

SP 39704 15185, 3 *G.lutea* leaves, with *Adoxa moschatelina*, a deeply shaded spot. (no photo) SP 39746 15120, 9 *G.lutea* leaves, in shallow dip, c. 1-1.5m back from banktop, and close to a bankside hazel. See photo.



SP 39808 15048, 5 G.lutea leaves, just beside end of a log, c. 1m back from banktop. See photo.
